Finance Report

This is an updated report as given to PMC Council March 2025 (the figures now include an additional grant expected from circuit to help with our costs of doing mission).

Using five months of data with which to predict our position at the end of this financial year (August). Bear in mind this is a basic extrapolation of core income to date versus what we budgeted for expenditure. A significant adjustment downwards to our expenditure due to Circuit halving our Assessment this year is included in the figures:

As you can see, even with the generous help from Circuit, if we spend the entire budget will are still predicted to draw on our dwindling reserves to make up the difference.

Last year the Property Team managed to come in significantly under budget which improved our end of year accounts significantly (over £20,000). However, because there are several property projects (boiler replacement, roofing works, etc) that may require us to respond quickly in addition to their current budget we

ought to consider previous 'savings' more as 'deferred expenditure'.

The Treasurer team continue to highlight to Circuit that a restructuring of how the core costs of staff and buildings is needed which better match the reality of PMC's income. The new Cumbria Circuit will use the church site as their hub. A meeting with David Newlove (new Circuit Superintendent) and Stephen Radford (Circuit Finance working group) will be arranged in September to discuss the future financing of the shared building.

Continued thanks to all who support us financially in addition to the significant volunteer work done in support of our ministry and mission.

Treasurer Team



A loud crash and glass falling from skylight above the lift heralded Storm Eowyn's arrival, with further widespread damage occurring even as we boarded up the hole. Repairs were eventually completed by middle of April with most of the considerable cost to be covered by our Insurers.

PROPERTY REPORT

Another dramatic event saw 4 people rescued from the lift in

September due to a fault in the UPS unit. We have had ongoing problems with the replacement unit while our lift contractor is reluctant to engage in meaningful dialogue to resolve issue.

Less exciting, but equally time consuming, was the Electrical Condition Report (required every 5 years for all fixed wiring in building). This uncovered a few minor faults requiring subsequent remedial work, but also a lot of bad labelling of circuits on our largest distribution board. It will be easier for those following in 5 years! Annual 'Portable Appliance Testing' condemned a toaster and revealed a most unsatisfactory situation under the sound desk. A small committee drawn from both Tech and Property teams met on site and agreed that having several additional sockets added to the ring circuit would allow PJ to safely re-connect present equipment with scope for future developments.

Many of you will have noticed the arrival of the new dishwasher early in our financial year, but who could locate the new water heater recently required for the toilet?

Since our former young, energetic, technically qualified Property Steward left, property matters have perforce become even more of a team effort. Mentored by Jim Irving, with his long experience and knowledge of both our building and how things happen at District level and beyond, Steve Clements mainly worries about Budget matters, insurance and deals with energy suppliers. He and Dave Fortey continue trying to discern the best way forward in heating the building.

Saving PMC a lot of money each year, the 'A Team' (Ian Mutch and Mike Wicker) carry out a highly varied, often risky, frequently dirty and sometimes just high, range of hands-on jobs. I just hold the ladder and find the lamps/parts/tools. Brian Gardiner is ever willing to assist, but more likely to be found repairing chairs in the Sanctuary or wielding a paintbrush. Lyndsay Wilson of course is regularly in the building sorting all sorts of issues and knowing when to call on the volunteers.

With the retirement of Tim and Tracey we will lose our Chairperson, leadership representative, note-taker and decorating enthusiast! The average age will also leap upwards.

Health and Safety had reached a very good standard, with a monitoring system on our Property Database, but our record keeping is no longer up to date.

We desperately need someone to take the lead or at least assist with this aspect of a Property Stewards responsibilities.

Meanwhile we few will continue to do 'All we can, with everything we can, for as long as we can!'

Youth Club

Junior Youth Club continues to meet at 7:30 on Tuesday evenings as it has done for many years, being a constant in the outreach and community work of the church. PMC opens it's doors to provide a safe space for 7-11 year olds to enjoy themselves for an hour.

Activities include football, dodge ball, table tennis, table football, crafts, a space to sit and chat or just running around, making as much noise as possible! It's maybe not for the faint hearted! In the summer term it is great on a lovely evening to be out in St Catherin's field watching the group enjoying themselves.

Numbers are normally quite low at the start of the new session, as quite a large proportion of the group will have been Year 6's who will have moved on to secondary school after the summer break. However, from a group of 5 or 6 the numbers climb steadily, and we are now back up at around 30 young people. Again, quite a few of these will leave in July and as yet there isn't anything regular for them to go on to. Hence we get asked 'Can we not keep coming on a Tuesday Night?'

The regular leaders are Aerin, a trainee Youth and Children's Worker here in Penrith and myself. Morgan has managed to be there most weeks, but when he isn't we are supported by a group of willing volunteers on a rota basis—namely Alison, Bea, Kath, Helen and Tracey.

Every week is a constant reminder of how much I miss Allan Stout, who sadly died vey suddenly last October. Although not a member of the church, Allan helped out at youth club every week for nearly 30 years and was so reliable in organising the snacks and supervising games so you can imagine how much he is missed. Please continue to remember his wife Christine and sons Mark and Jonny and family as they adjust to not having him here.

With Morgan's duties changing, he will not be available that often for Youth Club so I would like to ask if anyone feels they could help out on a rota basis. On weeks that I am unable to be there, Youth Club can't run unless there is a male leader to help out. So, I would be grateful if you feel you could help.

On a positive note, it is great fun and very worthwhile! We are looking forward to hopefully having our regular end of term trip to Walby Farm Park but before you know it, it will be September again.


At PMC, we believe that it is our responsibility to stand for justice in the name of Jesus.

We could really use some more people to volunteer to take the pressure off our current roster. The three roles have varying complexities, with live stream and projection being the easiest, and sound needing just a bit more experience.

Eden Cap Services

The year started fairly quietly which allowed Jen and Jo valuable time and space to connect with other services providing health and wellbeing support throughout Eden.

Since January, Jen also got the opportunity to speak at 4 different local churches sharing vision and opportunities for individuals to connect.

Both these pieces of work have been very valuable and fruitful. Since February the Debt Centre has had a flurry of new referrals (new appointments are currently booked up all the way to the end of July) and there has been fresh interest in people wanting to join the befriender team. The team have also had some helpful discussions around funding which they hope will open up opportunities for increased financial stability for the future.

The Debt Centre is continuing to see clients go debt free which is wonderful however, with the complexities of people's lives Jen and Jo often find the people they are working with require increased amounts of time and support. The outworking of this is often collaborative working with other professionals, regular visits, supporting people with phone calls and advocacy work.

The Job Club remains temporarily closed and plans to re-launch in September 2025.

Opportunities:

Pray: There are regular opportunities throughout the year to get together to pray for the work of CAP here in Eden. This is foundational to all the work that goes on.

Volunteer: There are many opportunities to volunteer at the Debt Centre and the Job Club, with flexibility in the amount of time and level of commitment needed.

Minutes of PMC ACM 23rd June 2024

<u>Review</u>

Sadly this year we said goodbye to Irene Dobbinson, Keith Scott & Grattan Bowen. Patricia Coop, Cathy Taylor & Ruby Morton have moved away from Cumbria.

Last September our Circuit (Penrith) merged with KOAM to form the East Cumbria Methodist Circuit. In Sept 2025, subject to Conference approval, we will merge as one whole Cumbria Circuit.

<u>PMC's 150th celebration</u> was a huge success & a great legacy to all the people who worshipped here & hosted wonderful events.

<u>Finance</u>

This financial year, our anticipated income will be £186,000. Our outgoings are expected to be £251,000 - £64,000 deficit.

Inflation this year will be 10%

This is the last time that we will be able to use our reserves to fund deficits. The matched funding has accumulated £10,000 - £12,000. There is still time to increase your giving to be part of this matched funding. But generally, PLEASE give more money if you can & please pray about the situation.

Fortunately, we have been given £20,000 in grants & Circuit are now paying 30% towards both Morgan's and Sarah's salary.

A heartfelt thanks was given to the Finance Team.

It was agreed by members of Church Council to sign last year's accounts.

Property

- The lettings cover PMC's day to day Property costs. But this is a listed building which is very expensive to maintain.
- Our very old boiler is a concern & a working group has been set up to try to source a suitable eco-friendly replacement. They are working with The Churches Trust for Cumbria.
- The Ullswater Room has been sanded & badminton lines put down.

A huge thanks was given to the Property Team.

<u>Worship</u>

Different Sunday Service styles; Tuesday morning worship; monthly Encounter & Woodland Collective.

Thanks was given to all the people involved in these services: stewards, welcomers, flower arrangers, those on the coffee rota, tech team, worship group and organists, etc.

PMC activities

- Youth Clubs the children & parents mostly have no other experience with church. Helen is stepping down from the Junior Youth Club in September. The Senior Youth Club is exploring joining with other church youth clubs from September. Please pray about this. More help is needed with both youth clubs.
- 4F needs more help. It receives funding for school holiday events so is able to do more.
- A new Alpha course is being launched in September

- Weekly choral group
